

2023 was a milestone year for Gazelle Foundation Co-Founder Gilbert Tuhabonye and the Gazelle Foundation.



For everybody who knows him, Gilbert embodies the power of optimism and perseverance. In response to Gilbert's story and to spread peace, the Gazelle Foundation was created to bring life-saving clean water and hope to people in Burundi.

Gilbert's indomitable spirit, infectious joy, and dedication to his birth country prove that our common humanity is greater than the sum of the world's injustices. To celebrate the strength and resilience of his 30th anniversary, we reflect on the power that each of us has to make the world a brighter, more compassionate place. We thank you for supporting our work to bring clean water, hope and peace to so many people in rural Burundi, East Africa. Since 2006, partnerships with supporters like you have made it possible for us to give permanent access to clean water to more than 125,000 individuals.

ABOUT THE GAZELLE FOUNDATION

The Gazelle Foundation brings clean water and transformative change to Burundi, one village at a time.

We built our purpose in our founder's footsteps: Gilbert Tuhabonye has embraced a life of joy and forgiveness. For Gilbert, the burn scars on his body remain a daily reminder of surviving a horrific genocide in 1993. For the people who know him, Gilbert embodies the power of optimism and perseverance. We believe that regardless of circumstances or obstacles, anyone can make the world a better, more compassionate place.

As Gilbert says, water is the number one issue in Africa. In Burundi, water is everywhere, but it is not clean. Burundi is one of the poorest countries in the world, and the leading cause of death is from preventable, waterborne diseases.

Clean water is the foundation for improved health, better educational opportunities, safer communities, and economic investment. Most of all, it provides hope to a country mostly forgotten by the world.


All Gazelle Foundation water systems provide clean water, free of charge, for life to all community members – regardless of tribe, ethnicity, or religion – with the aim of fostering long-term peace and stability in the region. Due to our unique structure and in-country partners, our cost to build water systems is lower than average, and working in a single, small country means it is easy to track the long-term impact.

To date, over 125,000 people have daily access to clean water because of the Gazelle Foundation's generous supporters. Gilbert, our dynamic board of directors, and hundreds of volunteers work tirelessly to bring awareness to the needs of the Burundian people while educating our local community about the importance of the global water crisis and the need for humanitarian aid in Burundi.

Water is Life: Transforming Futures

Creating transformational change in Burundi, a densely populated East African nation with a history of ethnic conflict is a tall order. A majority of citizens live in small villages and walk for miles up and down Burundi's verdant hills to fetch water that is muddy and contaminated.

By changing one small thing - creating closer access to clean water - lives and futures are permanently transformed for the better. By being the change he wanted to see in the world, Gilbert shares his joy for life and reminds us that small actions make a big difference, even a world away.

Those of us with ready access to safe drinking water often underestimate the foundational nature of clean water. Without it, life grinds to a halt. Drinking, washing, cleaning, and food preparation become unreasonably difficult.

Disease from waterborne contaminants are the leading cause of death in Burundi, one of the poorest countries in the world. Water collection efforts, not to mention illness, cut into critical time for the number one pursuit vital to breaking the cycle of poverty: education.


WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO


When a community in Burundi partners with the Gazelle Foundation to build a clean water system, they get more than clean water. They also get improved health, better educational and economic opportunities, safer communities, and hope for a brighter future.

According to the World Health Organization, every dollar invested in clean water yields \$4 - \$12 in economic returns. In Burundi, building water systems provides jobs and stimulates local economies in a country with one of the highest unemployment rates in the world, and where the average family lives on less than \$600 a year.

Because we partner with communities, investing in local materials and local tradespeople, our systems are built to last. Building and maintenance knowledge stays within the community, and our low-tech, sustainable approach results in water systems with longevity and a lasting, lifelong impact.

Our vision is for every man, woman and child in Burundi to have clean water, the highest quality of life, and hope within reach.






Our Water Systems: Sustainable for Life

Clean water is foundational to community health and reversing the cycle of poverty. But the water systems must work long-term to provide lasting change. Our efficient, effective water systems employ a low-tech, sustainable approach to construction. Our experienced, local project manager and engineer hires community members to build each water system, ensuring that construction and maintenance knowledge stays local.

Keeping employment, materials, and knowledge local ensures system success in the short and long term. Once water systems are complete, ownership of the water system is turned over to the community. In 17 years, we have built 66 water systems in Burundi, which continues our 100% track record of success.







Each water system we build:

Improves health by reducing or eliminating deadly waterborne diseases. The vast majority of Burundians live in rural areas with mountainous terrain where water infrastructure is absent. While groundwater is plentiful, it is often contaminated. This is why waterborne pathogens which can cause typhoid, hepatitis A, schistosomiasis, bacterial and protozoal diarrhea, and death are all too common.

However, in areas where we have installed clean water systems, local health centers report a dramatic decrease in waterborne illness and a significant improvement in overall health. In one community, a clinic doctor reported the prevalence of waterborne illnesses decreased from 76% down to 11% after a Gazelle Foundation water system was installed. The same doctor estimated that the availability of clean water saves the lives of three children per month in his clinic alone.

Hygiene and sanitation improve by leaps and bounds, increasing the quality of care available at rural health clinics. Improved hygiene is cited as a reason for fewer bacterial infections as well. When a water system is completed, the local community is taught about the health benefits of handwashing.

Increases educational access, allowing children to attend school regularly. When access to clean water eliminates waterborne illnesses, children are sick less often, which allows them to attend school on a more regular basis. With shortened walking distances, they spend less time fetching water. Better educational opportunities improve their life-long earning potential. According to the World Bank, returns on education investment are the largest in Africa over any other continent, and each additional year of schooling raises earnings by 11% for boys and 14% for girls.

Creates shorter, safer walking distances to water. Our clean water systems dramatically reduce the distance traveled to access water, from approximately 4 miles to one-quarter of a mile, due to the strategic placement of public-access tap stands. This means substantially less time is required to fetch and carry water, a job traditionally done by women and children. The net result is that children spend more time in school, and women can pursue activities to make their family resilient. In addition, the shorter distance eliminates the dangers of being away from home for hours at a time and traveling through mountainous terrain.

Equitably provides clean water to all, healing divisions, and building **common ground.** Access to water at each tap stand is available to all people at no cost, regardless of tribe, ethnicity, or religion. Of the three main tribes in Burundi - Hutu, Tutsi, and Batwa - the Batwa are the most marginalized, making up just 1% of the total population. They are the poorest of the poor, lacking access to not only water but also education, food sources, and health care. The Batwa are often forgotten in terms of their human rights and needs. The Gazelle Foundation chose to build our










Why the Foundation is Uniquely Prepared to Respond

System Highlights 2023

In 2023, we had the privilege of bringing clean water - and hope - to 6,650 people in four communities. That's 6,650 new people with daily access to safe, clean water, bringing each of them one step closer to better health, economic stability, and opportunity.



This system was funded exclusively by our 2022 sustaining member community, AMAZI For Burundi. It has changed the lives of everyone who relies on the Nyazuba health center in addition to supporting the local community. This system provides clean water to the community in Matana, which is located in mountainous terrain like many of the areas we serve. Previously, this community relied on a contaminated water source several miles away. We thank the generous individuals who changed the lives of the people in this community through access to clean water.

• 60 people employed • 2,500 residents served This water system was funded in part by 2022 Global Run For The Water participants for the first time. Clean water is now available to a large community, which includes a primary school, college, and community center. During construction, the project scope was modified to bring clean water to a nearby meat processing facility, which serves 4,500 people weekly. Access to clean water eliminates a common source of waterborne disease transmission and improves hygiene immeasurably. We expect that clean water will have an immeasurable public health impact on the wider community.

The Gazelle Foundation refurbished and extended a failed water system originally constructed decades ago by a different organization. The construction team built a collection chamber, refurbished two existing tanks, and added new infrastructure to bring clean water and hope to many more people in the years to come. The water source now has the appropriate flow for a system this size. This water system was completed 2-1/2 weeks ahead of schedule. Our project success rate is 100% because we design and build sustainable water systems in partnership with the community. We hire locally so water system knowledge remains in the community, once the system is complete and ownership is handed off to community leaders. Our proven process means we expect this water system to serve this community for generations to come.

Of the water systems constructed this year, this water system stretched the longest at just under 5 miles long of hand-dug water infrastructure up and down the mountainous terrain. Despite the challenges, the system was completed 3 weeks ahead of schedule.


When complete, this system will serve 1,500 people, including 288 students and teachers at Musenyi Primary School, and 200 members of Musenyi Catholic Church. Through their partnership, their global community championed people, peace, and the planet.


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RAISING AWARENESS FOR THE MISSION

AMAZI For Burundi, our sustaining donor community

Thanks to our 2023 AMAZI for Burundi donors, construction on the Kiriza-Gisisye Extension Water System began on December 20, 2023. Our sustaining donor community is named for its purpose; Amazi means water in Kirundi, the local language.

The project extends an existing water system built by the Gazelle Foundation in 2019. The population of the community grew by 40% from 2,100 people to 2,960. The original system and the decrease in waterborne disease transformed the area into a thriving community. Investing in the new sustainable water infrastructure is vital to providing the inhabitants with clean and safe water for their daily use and helping to ensure environmental, economic, and social health. We thank our incredible community of givers for making this water system a reality. In 2023, many AMAZIng people participated in our sustaining membership community. We look forward to growing this wonderful group in 2024.

eBay Employee Fundraiser Sponsors a Water Tank

Staff at eBay contacted the Gazelle Foundation because they were looking for a sustainable, charitable project to bring clean water to a country in need. We gave them information about our process that enabled their distributed team to sponsor the construction of a water tank that supplies 4 tap stands, including the ones at Musenyi Primary School in Burundi. Employees from around the world solicited 246 donations and logged 352 volunteer hours to make it happen. Employees from the United States, Ireland, United Kingdom, India, Germany, Kuala Lumpur, Singapore, China, Australia, and Japan worked together to fund a new water tank in Burundi. As a result, the Musenyi Primary School now has clean water for students and staff thanks to eBay's support. A permanent plaque was added to the water tank in their honor.

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














Walk For The Water

Austin Gives Miles

The Gazelle Foundation was fortunate to participate in Austin Gives Miles, the philanthropic program of the Ascension Seton Austin Marathon presented by UnderArmour that connects race participants to local non-profit organizations. We have participated in the program for four years, and are one of 25 Official Charity Partners in the program.

Thanks to our incredible volunteers and donors, the Gazelle Foundation successfully qualified for a \$10,000 grant from the Moody Foundation. 2023 marks the eighth year that the Moody Foundation has matched funds raised by the Official Charities of the Austin Gives Miles program.

Their lifetime giving to Austin Gives Miles charities is \$1.5M and growing, and \$50,000 has directly benefited the Gazelle Foundation. Our partnership with the Austin Marathon and the Austin Gives Miles program has a clear and direct impact on our ability to provide clean, accessible water to people in Burundi.
















GILBERT'S 30TH ANNIVERSARY WALK TOWARD FORGIVENESS

Each year on October 21, Gilbert Tuhabonye celebrates his second chance at life with a walk toward forgiveness. On that day in 1993, he ran for his life and lived to tell what happened. He was a 12th grader and national champion runner when the centuries-old war between the Tutsi and Hutu tribes erupted in Burundi. Gilbert, along with a hundred Tutsi classmates and teachers, were forced into a room where they were beaten and burned. Gilbert, on fire, ran to freedom and survived this horrific event.

After recovering from his injuries and finding a place of safety, Gilbert searched for a way to both forgive and transform lives in a positive way in his home country. He co-founded the Gazelle Foundation to spread access to clean water and hope in an area of the world that is often forgotten.

To honor the anniversary of life and to remind people how difficult it is for most people in Burundi to access clean water, Gilbert gathers with friends to carry water jugs from Lady Bird Lake to the Capitol building. The walk brings awareness to the global water problem, its solution, and the profound impact our supporters have in providing clean water to those who need it most.

In remembrance of the 30th anniversary, several events were held including: • a special fundraising campaign where donations to Gilbert's 30th-anniversary campaign helped us reach our goal and secure a \$10,000 matching grant. • Prior to the walk, Mary Ann Frishman presented Gilbert with a special certificate of congratulations signed by Austin Mayor Kirk Watson. • Media interviews were also held for the special celebration
